BACKGROUND :

The Theme on Indigenous and Local Communities, Equity, and Protected Areas (TILCEPA), was set up in 2000 by the World Commission on Protected Areas (WCPA) and the Commission on Environmental, Economic, and Social Policy (CEESP) of the World Conservation Union (IUCN) . TILCEPA is a global network of people working on issues of communities and equity in relation to Protected Areas.

VISION STATEMENT :

TILCEPA seeks the full and effective recognition of the rights and responsibilities of indigenous peoples and local communities in the development and implementation of conservation policies and strategies that affect the lands, waters and other natural and cultural resources that they relate to. It advocates, in all countries, the recognition of community conserved and managed areas that are significant from biodiversity point of view, and the development of management partnerships with the communities resident in or surrounding government designated PAs.

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RECOMMENDATIONS AT THE WORLD PARKS CONGRESS

During the World Parks Congress, a number of recommendations will be considered in the context of the Workshop Streams and Theme sessions over **11-13 September**. The topics were selected and draft recommendations have been prepared in advance to enable participants to contribute their views. TILCEPA will be participating in the preparation of six of these recommendations. These have been listed below along with the schedule of meetings to discuss the recommendations.

Recommendations will be considered in workshop streams/themes and there will be breakout rooms to discuss specific issues. Discussion will be in Rooms 4-1; 4-2; 4-3; 4-6. Sessions times for specific recommendations will be announced on site.

1. Co Managed Protected Areas

Lead: Grazia Borrini-Feyerabend

September 12

1900 - 2000

Highlights the need to move towards co-management of officially designated protected areas, which have resident or dependent populations. This would include issues of joint institutional arrangements and decision-making, recognition of rights and responsibilities of each stakeholder, sharing of benefits, and appropriate legal/policy measures.

2. Community Conserved Areas

Leads : Ashish Kothari and Neema Pathak

September 12

1900 - 2000

Highlights the need to recognize the full range of sites significant for biodiversity conservation, that are being controlled and managed by communities (indigenous and others). This would include issues of customary law, traditional institutions and knowledge, recognition of tenurial and ancestral rights and domain, and appropriate legal/policy measures. It would encourage the recognition of the ecological and social benefits of such areas as complementary to government declared and co-managed protected areas.

3. Indigenous People and Protected Areas

Leads : Aroha Mead, Alejandro Argumedo and Gonzalo Oviedo

Addresses the issue of indigenous peoples and protected areas. It would address the need to recognize the territorial rights, knowledge, and practices of indigenous peoples in relation to protected areas, and of the necessity of their full participation in such areas.

4. Mobile Peoples and Protected Areas

Lead : Maryam Niamir-Fuller

As in the case of No. 3 above, but of course with the recognition of the special situation of mobile peoples. This will build on the Dana Declaration, and through TILCEPA

facilitation will be drafted by mobile peoples and other groups working with them, who are participating at the Congress.

5. Good Governance of Protected Areas

Lead : Jim Johnston

Urges those involved in the establishment and management of protected areas to strive for 'good governance' including taking into account key elements such as openness, transparency, and accountability in decision making; exercising inclusive leadership; mobilizing support from diverse communities; sharing authority and resources and devolving decision making authority and resources where appropriate and where capacity exists.

6. Recognising and supporting a diversity of Governance Types for Protected Areas

Lead : Jim Johnston

Urges participants to recognise and support a diversity of governance types and mechanisms for protected areas, including ownership and management by national governments, decentralized governance by provincial or local government, co-management arrangements between various stakeholders, ownership or management by indigenous or local communities, and management by private sector entities under long term contract or outright private ownership;

INDIGENOUS, LOCAL AND MOBILE PEOPLES PARTICIPATION

In partnership with the Ad Hoc Working Group for the WPC , TILCEPA has also focussed on ensuring a fair participation of indigenous peoples, local community representatives and mobile peoples at the Congress.

Indigenous Peoples' Ad Hoc Working Group for the World Parks Congress

The *Indigenous Peoples' Ad Hoc Working Group for the World Parks Congress* was set up in January 2003 to promote effective indigenous peoples' participation in the World Parks Congress. The group is run by a small, open steering committee of key indigenous peoples' organisations from North, Central and South America, Central and East Africa, South-East Asia, Russia and Australasia. A small extempore 'desk' to service the group is run by the UK-based support group, the Forest Peoples Programme. With considerable help from the IUCN and TILCEPA and through its own fund-raising efforts, the Ad Hoc Group expects to sponsor and host the participation of about 100 indigenous representatives at the World Parks Congress. Through this coordination, the Ad Hoc Group has helped ensure that indigenous peoples'

spokespersons will participate directly in a large number of workshops, symposia and in the plenary events of the Congress. During the Congress, presentations by indigenous persons will also be made in side events, press conferences and in the 'Community Park'.

The Ad Hoc Group is also organising a two-day Indigenous Peoples' Preparatory Conference, which is being held at the Blue Waters Hotel in Durban on the 6th and 7th of September, with the aim of ensuring a well-informed and coordinated input by indigenous peoples to the Congress, which starts the following week. The IPs Preparatory Conference is open to invited participants only. The international indigenous visitors at the IPs' Preparatory Conference are being hosted by the National Khoi San Conference of South Africa, with the assistance of the secretariat of Indigenous Peoples of Africa Coordinating Committee (IPACC).

COMMUNITY PARK "LOCAL TO GLOBAL LEARNING FOR PEOPLE, PARKS AND PROSPERITY"

The Community Park at the World Parks Congress (WPC) will be dedicated to creating opportunities to spotlight stories from grassroots sustainable development victories won by community level action around the world and to encourage dialogue about future challenges for protected areas. The Community Park will provide a dialogue space to explore the "Parks-People Relationship". It will provide a context to move beyond "conflict management" toward "dialogue" and "co-management".

The Community Park will be hosted by a group of community representatives that will be selected on the basis of the "best practices" they offer to the World Parks Congress and on gender, constituency and their geographic location. This will ensure that all communities and peoples are represented equally.

Facilities at the park will be:

- Community dialogue space in the centre of the park will facilitate group (community-to-community) discussions, presentations, press conferences and media interaction;
- Huts designed in the vernacular style will serve as meeting rooms;
- Exhibition spaces will serve as an informal area;
- Technological facilities for use by the community members.

The park is designed to facilitate dialogue between community members in an effort to influence outcomes of the World Parks Congress and future policy decisions. It is also designed to provide a "home" where community members, protected area managers, World Heritage Site managers, and organisations from around the world can meet during the WPC to engage with other communities and their partners to influence key events and outcomes of the Congress
